BODY SHAMING

AN ASIAN PERSPECTIVE

Your first thought could be '*okay, this is another useless article*', but hey just a pep talk. Hear me out.

Wait, but what really is BODY SHAMING?

For your information, Body-shaming could be described as an act where, people are being told they're too skinny, too fat, too pale, too tall, too short, lanky, spotty, not muscular enough, the list goes on.

It is always very easy to look at a person and say 'you are fat' or 'you are too boney' when you see them. Also, it's like a general thing now to look at someone and say 'you are a shorty!' or make vain comments on how tall they are. It has become like a mandatory topic for most of our Asians specifically to make a comment on someone's size and appearance at gatherings.

If you haven't been to a gathering and an aunt who is plump herself hasn't commented on your size or complexion, count yourself lucky because I haven't been to one single gathering here without at least a handful of aunties commenting on appearances. (I am not exaggerating!)

If you are one of that kind of disparaging people then this is for you.

Have you ever thought for a second of the consequences your one lousy comment could create? I'll tell you what I learned.

According to bullyingstatistics.org a huge 94 percent of women and 84 percent of men are affected by body-shaming. And a government report found 60 percent of adults said they feel 'ashamed' of the way they look. The issue of body-shaming is seen to be one that affects all society, regardless of age, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, disability, body size and shape. Some groups were seen to be 'more vulnerable' to body image concerns, including children and adolescents, according to the government report.

Having body-image issues and being verbally attacked for the way you look can be incredibly damaging to mental health. The government report found body image dissatisfaction 'undermines self-confidence', and in turn contributes to a higher risk of depression. They believe promoting positive body image is 'fundamental to addressing other social and public health problems facing young people'. You find this act of body shaming not just in social media through indirect comments from fake profiles or direct comments but you can now see people making direct comments face-to-face, which I think is extremely hurtful and inappropriate.

Growing up in an Asian household, I have experienced many instances of body shaming. For a matter of fact, Asians are a lot that does not understand the seriousness of body shaming because for them, as I had already mentioned, this is just a part of their conversation. What we need to understand is that if discrimination based on skin color is a serious issue then body-shaming demands equal actions for eradication.

Some take body-shaming as a very light issue because they are 'only making a funny remark' and soon this becomes content for there 'meme creation'.

For those who take this as a trivial matter,

That person you body-shamed is someone who is already worried about how they look and NO! they are not happy with it.

That person you body-shamed hates standing on weight-scales because it stresses them out.

That person you body-shamed is eating all the junk and deteriorating their self to gain some weight.

That person you body-shamed is crying every time they look into the mirror.

That person you body-shamed cannot take happy bites of their everyday meal.

That person you body-shamed is already hurt every time they can't wear their favorite clothes.

That person you body-shamed is already feeling worthless.

That person you body-shamed is starving their self to death.

That person you body-shamed is under a lot of physical and mental pain.

That person you body-shamed is now under depression.

If a futile comment of yours in the name of 'being funny/sarcastic' has made someone feel worthless and suicidal, if a meme you created in the content of 'body-shaming' for fame has become the reason why one cannot socialize anymore, you are a delinquent. If this does not haunt you, if this does not make you for a second regret a comment you've contributed to body-shaming then you are the biggest loser you'll ever find in this world full of losers.

The Blind Cook Who Turned Master Chef





If you watched season three of Fox TV’s reality cooking show “MasterChef,” you remember the big smile that lit up Christine Ha’s face every time she impressed the judges with her bold flavors—and especially when her three-course meal of Vietnamese comfort food won Ha the “MasterChef” title.

What casual viewers may not have realized right away is that the amateur cook from Houston, Texas, is blind. In 2003, Ha was diagnosed with neuromyelitis optica (NMO), a rare neurological condition that deteriorates the optic nerves and spinal cord. By 2007, Ha had lost most of her vision. But she had regained her love of reading, with help from the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped (NLS).

“[NLS] reignited my love for literature. It was what kept me sane when I went through my first bouts of NMO,” says Ha, who also authors the blog theblindcook.com. “When I went through some of my worst health issues in 2003—complete paralysis from my neck down due to spinal inflammation, and complete blindness—all I could do was lie in bed and listen to NLS audiobooks.”

NLS, part of the Library of Congress, oversees a free reading program for U.S. residents and citizens living abroad who are blind, have low vision, or cannot hold a book because of a physical disability. NLS patrons may choose from tens of thousands of books and dozens of magazines in audio and braille—including dozens of cookbooks, such as “O, the Oprah Magazine Cookbook” and titles by Julia Child, James Beard, and other famous foodies. NLS also loans the portable playback equipment needed to read its audiobooks. Computer-savvy patrons may access books online through the NLS Braille and Audio Reading Download (BARD) service.

Ha, who is pursuing a master of fine arts degree at the University of Houston, always has a book checked out from NLS. Recently she was reading Gail Caldwell’s “Let’s Take the Long Way Home” in braille. And her “MasterChef” cookbook, was released in 2013.

AN INTERVIEW WITH RAWA MAJDI

Performance Poet & Co-Founder of Kuwait Poets Society



You perceive one of your unique hidden talents, something that you're extremely passionate about and really good at from within yourself, work on it in order to improve yourself and share it with somebody else who has got the exact same talent in order to receive feedback. What next? You decide to share your mutual interests and passion with an even bigger crowd following the same process, sharing your aptitude and art seeking feedback in areas of excellence and necessary improvements. That's how you create, lead and mold an excellent team of beginners transforming them into professionals in a respective field. Be it poetry, drama, writing, role-play or even music composing.

Team Merak sat down with one of such amazing women who had the confidence and courage to jointly find and provide a safe environment for a group of people who shared the same passion as hers asking her to throw light on the organization she founded along with her sister and to share a few beneficial information regarding performance-poetry with us.

Kuwait Poets Society started as a late-night idea that I came up with my sister, AJ. Back then, we both felt like we knew a lot of poets in Kuwait, but didn't know a safe space where we could share and discuss poetry. We wanted feedback on our work too. I tweeted a call for poets, then we started a Whatsapp group followed by our very first meeting in January 2016. It has grown and expanded since then - we've had open mics, poetry and music events, and have started publishing a zine - but at our core, we're the same ragtag group of writers. KPS "ended" as KPS in May 2019, but we're rising like a phoenix as a new platform in Autumn.



There's this idea that poetry has no rules, that there is no way that you can define poetry. I think I agree with that. Poetry is in the way that a piece of writing feels. Fiction is very different, in that it can be defined as a story with a beginning, middle, and end. However, I think a piece of fiction can also be described as poetic or prosaic.

KPS had wanted to publish a zine of our work for a long time, and the idea was finally pushed into action by the founding editor, Carina Milena Maceira. She's doing an amazing job with it - every issue has been so special, filled with creative work by authors and artists across the MENASA. (Middle East North Africa South Asia)

I write spoken word the most, or performance poetry. Spoken word can be extremely simple, but poignant. It routinely uses cadence and flow to take the audience on a roller-coaster ride of emotions, as well as wordplay puns, alliteration, and assonance are commonly used.



I began writing poetry in eighth grade, when I took a Creative Writing class with an excellent teacher, Ms. Chantaj. Ms. Chantaj pushed me into expanding on my prosaic descriptions during our sessions and that eventually turned into poetry. I loved writing, and continued to do so throughout high school, but only for myself. I read a lot of poetry too. I started writing performance poetry (the complete opposite of poetry for myself) around 5-6 years later, and then performed for the first time with Word of Mouth Kuwait in 2015.

I have been rejected a plenty of times. Part of being a published poet (or aspiring to be one) is dealing with rejection. It's simply unavoidable. For me, the trick was to realize that it wasn't personal. The poem was just not what the editors were looking for. And that's okay. The poem will find a home eventually.



"If you find yourself standing against the shoreline waiting for waves to take you under, pray for patience and low tide."

My poetry begins as a little snippet of something - a word or a line, sparks something in me and it unravels as I write it down. Once I start writing, I don't follow any specific rules. I'll write the ending before the beginning, the middle before any other part, jump around in the middle of lines to make things match. I love the chaotic-ness and creativity in writing a new piece.

A performance poet will prepare their poetry or spoken word for the stage. Rather than simply reading their poetry in front of an audience, a performance poet embodies it - I like to say that a performance poet must act, and must act specifically as though they are feeling the same feelings they did while writing the poem, even if they don't feel those feelings anymore. That's the only way the audience is able to feel those feelings, too.

Spoken word can be extremely simple, but poignant.

At the end, it all comes down to how much time one allocates to reading. The more, the better of a poet or an author one becomes. 

WHY FEMINISM

Feminism, a word that makes some sneer in disgust of the "man-hating" extremists, while others proudly debate and celebrate the rights of women. But, what does feminism actually mean? Today, we will examine the many forms of the movement on each of the seven continents in order to fully grasp the entire reality of the subject.

American feminists have played a very prominent role in modern politics & activism in their country, and it's easy to see why. After staging the largest single-day protest in the nation's history, the Women's March Network (WME) has continued to be a large proponent of women's rights and equality movement. The WME recently published its 2019 "Women's Agenda", a list of their policy priorities from January 2019 through January 2021. The list includes causes such as "Ending Violence against Women & Femmes", "Reproductive Rights & Justice", and "LGBTQIA+ Rights".

Paraguayan women have taken great strides towards equality, although there is still much room for improvement. Within the past two years, they have made femicide and obstetric violence illegal, and introduced four separate initiatives to empower women in government & eliminate sex-based discrimination. But, women still are only paid 71 cents for every dollar a man makes, and are much less economically active.

Despite harsh treatment by the socialist government, the feminist movement has flourished in China. One of the most notable events in recent Chinese feminist history is the arrest of the "Feminist Five", a group of five female activists jailed (and subsequently released)

planning to distribute stickers against sexual assault on subways & buses. Since then, the government has taken targeted and direct action to take down the feminist movement, calling it the work of "Western hostile forces" in an attempt to villainise the campaign. Nevertheless, the women's rights movement has grown in thousands and have three main demands, "to make visible the work that women do and to redistribute it; equal opportunity of employment for women and men, and the right for every woman to have or not to have children".

In Rwanda, feminists have drastically changed the face of the nation. Boasting the largest share of females in their national government in the world, their legislature has taken revolutionary new steps to prevent sexual violence, including banning marital rape, recognising that rape is a form of perpetrating genocide, and creating legal exemptions to laws in order to allow for victims of rape to gain access to an abortion. The country has been declared the best nation in Africa to be a woman by the Global Competitiveness Report and has the fifth smallest pay gap in the world.

French feminism is certainly one of the most (if not the most) interesting and unique movements in this article. In their national language, every profession (i.e "un prof" translating to "a teacher") has a gender, and grammatically when one man is in a group of one hundred women the entire group would be referred to with a masculine plural pronoun, gender is one of the most central parts of the French everyday life. While this may not seem to be a critical issue, proponents of a movement to make adjectives and professions agender

fluid (i.e "un/e prof, with the "e" showing feminine gender identity) claim that "Telling children the masculine form wins over the feminine cannot contribute to shaping egalitarian minds". The leading authority on the French language, the Academie Française, recently backed down to the demands of the activists.

Australia has been labeled one of Global Citizen's "Top 10 Feminist Countries", and it's easy to see why. In a country where around three in four women work but still only make 86% of what their male counterparts do, the need for a women's rights movement is clear. Currently, the Equality Rights Alliance, a leading organisation in the movement for gender equality in the nation, advocates for "Gender equality, women's leadership and government policy responses that support women's diversity".

Feminist glaciology is not well known, but perhaps it should be. In Antarctica, a controversial 2016 study concluded that having more female scientists studying glacier melt could help combat global warming. This is because "women have a more nuanced look at how melting ice affects societies close to glaciers". The female perspective, it is suggested, is different from that of the male because women experience post-glacier melt disaster events uniquely.


